MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

The half-term break now seems a distant memory as both staff and students pack so much into the final seven weeks of the summer term and this academic year. The days may also be getting longer but the prospect of colder than normal temperatures until the end of the month is less than welcome news.

During the last two days of the break, Y11 and Y13 students came into school to make use of our study hub for revision and attended in-school revision sessions in preparation for the final furlong of public examinations, with the end now near in sight. We look forward to seeing our Year 13 students returning to school after exams for their celebration assembly in less than two weeks and we have also marked the end (or near-end) of exams with Year 11 students this afternoon. I commend all on the resilience they have shown and continue to show, seemingly taking exams in their stride. I know and appreciate their hard work behind the scenes and the inevitable additional stress they will be experiencing. It is clear that they are benefiting from extraordinary support at home from families and I want to express my thanks and that of the staff for the encouragement, care and support you have been providing, sometimes to more than one child in the household sitting exams at the same time a stress I can only imagine!

The school was well represented in the local community last weekend at the Hayes Fair, with students and staff running a games stall and our musicians performing. I also had the brief pleasure of joining a focus group meeting this week, at which our Year 12 students have been providing feedback to Bromley Y on their provision and ways to engage with schools and children and young people across Bromley. We are the only school, at present, to be engaging in this work as the organisation explores ways to work with young people to design and improve services. It was a real pleasure to see and

hear our students engaging with such passion and eloquence on the subject of adolescent mental health and wellbeing with representatives from Bromley Y and the Director of Education in Bromley.

Also this week, Year 12 students and families attended our Destinations Evening where, with the support of parents, alumni and other organisations, they could hear more and ask questions about university, student finance, apprenticeships and careers in a range of areas. Our History students have also recently returned from a trip to Berlin, a city rich in history and culture around every corner. I have heard nothing but positive feedback from staff about the students' interest and curiosity, excellent conduct and the respect they showed during a moving visit to Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp.

Finally, this has been an extremely emotional week for me as I have communicated changes to the leadership of the school from September to students, colleagues and families. I keep emphasising that I am 'not leaving,' whilst in reality I am of course stepping away from my day-to-day involvement leading and working in a school I love. Working with the Senior Leadership Team in recent weeks to complete our self-evaluation of the school and to identify our school improvement priorities, I am no less committed to supporting Miss Thompson and the brilliant team of staff at Hayes in moving the school forward for the benefit of our students, staff and school community.



Tiny Moments by Jennie Beattie

Our very own Mrs Beattie has had a poetry book published!

It's a delightful read comprising a variety of touching, funny, and reflective verse which would resonate with many people's day to day experience of life during Lockdown.

"Lockdown forced me to look inwards at a time when no-one could get out. It was a time full of snacks and home-learning and masks and sporadic shopping trips and careful shopping lists. It was a time of the unknown and shouting and tears and hugs and fears. It was also a time of lego bricks and pyjama days and PE with Joe and rainy walks and hot chocolate. Here are some of my tiny moments."

Memories of the Hajj (1985, 1992)

The Islamic month of Dhul Hijjah has started and Muslims all over the world will be celebrating the festival of Eid ul Adha during the 10th, 11th and 12th of the month (16th,17th,18th June).

The festival marks the end of the Hajj - pilgrimage to Makkah - which all Muslims are expected to undertake at least once in their lifetime provided they are physically, mentally and financially able to. Through various rituals, the pilgrimage commemorates the trials of the prophet Abraham, his son the prophet Ishamel and Ishmael's mother Hajar. Pilgrims circumambulate the Kaaba which was built by Abraham and his son Ishmael and re-enact the running of Hajar between two hills while she was searching for water for the baby Ishmael.

I have been blessed to experience the Hajj twice – the first time with my parents and grandmother and the second time with my husband. Both occasions were deeply spiritual with unforgettable moments such as:-

- the scene at the special Hajj airport terminal in Jeddah at the start where everyone looks similarly dressed, the socioeconomic backgrounds being indistinguishable; contrasting with the end when people are dressed in their different cultural attires;
- the first sight of the Kaaba a black cubed building, simple and yet majestic due to the throng of pilgrims circulating it all in the same anti-clockwise direction.
- the luxurious warmth of the bare ground when sleeping under the starry night sky in a place called Muzdalifah
- the joy of seeing an available taxi or a drinks kiosk when most needed
- feeling as if I am ready to drop and then being inspired by the sight of an elderly gentleman struggling with the circumambulation of the Kaaba who was persevering nonetheless.
- the wonderful taste of the Zamzam spring water
- watching my father lead prayers in the desert during a sandstorm his eyes closed to keep out the flying sand but his lips moving as he recites the Quranic verses
- the intense humidity in the tent in the valley of Arafat where the fans would just blow hot air, contrasting with the cool air-conditioned mosque in Mina

Transport links, accommodation, facilities have no doubt vastly improved since the 1990s but the crowds have increased and so the Hajj is still a test of stamina, patience and perseverance, whilst remaining a rich and rewarding experience with unique memories.

Sixth Form Design and Technology Foster + Partners

Over the half term, I arranged for some of our Sixth Form students to have a tour around the main headquarters of Foster and Partners (Architects) on the Thames with aspiring Architects Will Reeves (Y13) and Isabelle Ichide (Y12). Here we were given an all access tour of their studios to see some of the key processes for how they design buildings. We learnt that they design accessories, furniture and even luxury yachts as well as buildings, for which they are most recognised. Foster

employ over 1500 people from around the world with a diverse range of talent from different backgrounds. They employ two drone pilots, motion graphic designers, games designers, virtual reality specialists, Astro physicists, furniture designers, model makers, 3D printing experts, lawyers as well as architects and people in

planning. We were given the tour by Head of Learning and Development, Laggi Diamondi as well as Foster's Architect, Nadia Saki, both of whom were extremely passionate and proud of the work they do. Our students were given a chance to explore their vast material library and saw a sample of the 'Vantablack' coating which is the blackest material ever created with 99.965% absorption of visible light. So black you cannot make out any faces on a 3D form as all the features merge into one black shade. Will and Isabelle were given the chance to ask about routes into Fosters and which universities they recommend for studying architecture. A great opportunity to see one of the most innovative companies in the world and a great future link for our design students at Hayes.

It was interesting getting to see the inside of successful architecture firm, Foster and Partners. We got to see where all the architects work, some of the projects that they've been working on in model form, the huge library of architectural books (one of the biggest of its kind including some exclusive ones that would only otherwise be found in the archives) and their innovative printing and rendering technology that they use for model making and making realistic presentations of future projects. As someone that wants to study architecture, it was good getting to see what this work environment is like.
