MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Today marked the 'last day' for our Year 13 students, as they will be attending school only for exams after half-term. We look forward to celebrating their achievements and bidding them farewell at the Sixth Form Prom in June. We have seen them grow up in front of our eyes and could not be more proud of the young adults they have become. We are also thankful to them for their commitment and contribution to the life of the school, whether they joined in the Sixth Form or have been with us throughout their secondary school journey.

As public examinations at GCSE, AS, A-Level and in vocational courses are paused during half-term, I commend students on their exceptional conduct in the examination rooms. Our Year 11 and 13 students are deserving of a well-earned break from exams and will, I know, make the most of half-term. It provides an opportunity to get ahead with revision, but also to rest, recharge and recover. I remind students that they must, as they have done so far, continue to adhere to exam board regulations, ensuring that they do not bring any prohibited items into exam rooms, e.g. mobile phones, watches and notes.

As ever, it was a real highlight for me to spend time with our Year 10 and Year 12 students during last weekend's DofE Silver Practice Expedition. I am grateful to Mr Frost and Miss Andrews for their advance organisation as I arrived to accompany the expedition and drive the minibus down narrow country lanes, praying not to meet oncoming traffic. The students' resilience was tested by walking approximately 40 kilometres over the 3 days and all demonstrated great camp craft and teamwork, even if at times their navigation skills led them to get lost (albeit temporarily!) The comments from expedition leaders confirmed what we already know – it is a pleasure to work with and take our students out of school, with them demonstrating excellent behaviour and being fun to be around.

Our attention remains as focussed as ever on the classroom experience for students and we came together on Wednesday for a CPD marketplace event where teachers from all departments shared successful strategies they are using with classes, which support our teaching and learning priorities and best practice. On the subject of school development priorities, we began the process of identifying strengths, areas for development and opportunities in support of our school improvement planning cycle for 2024-25. I have also spent time this week with our Facilities Manager and several contractors looking at further improvements to our school estate. Having completed and reviewed the outcomes of a recent staff wellbeing survey, I look forward to launching a student survey next term in partnership with all schools across our trust to provide us with valuable feedback and suggestions from students in all years.

Finally, the announcement this week of a General Election on 4th July provides an opportunity not to be missed to engage our students in discussion. We look forward to raising students' political awareness, arranging a mock election and will be watching with interest developments nationally and the commitments of all political parties to education and the matters most of interest to our student body. If last week's Question Time event is anything to go by, there are a number of issues/concerns for our young people and they want to know how these can and will be addressed by political leaders and others.

I wish all our families a restful and enjoyable half-term break.

HayesCommunicates Question Time



On Thursday 16th May, HayesCommunicates ran our very first Question Time event, giving the young people of Hayes School an opportunity to put their questions to a panel of experts. Our motivations for this event were to give students a stronger voice, making it possible for them to put their concerns to a panel that had been specially selected to answer their questions. We were very lucky to have an incredibly engaged and enthusiastic live audience who asked some very thoughtful and clever questions. The panel consisted of Mr Whittle, Teodora Mindru (Student Leadership), Sarah Lewis (CEO of IMPACT Trust), Mrs Arney

(Designated Safeguarding Lead), Mark Sheldon (Bromley Y), Cllr. Coldspring White (Hayes and Coney Hall Ward) and Danie Gibbs (Bromley Youth Council).

The event took an awful lot of preparation and the HayesCommunicates team spent many hours in meetings, planning and testing all the equipment needed. We started out by preparing people for all the different roles that they would need to fulfil, before running all the tests that would need to be done before the event so that it would run smoothly. Tasks included finding extra equipment, learning how to use the software and preparing the questions that had been presubmitted to us by the students.

There was a lot of anticipation for the event, and when Question Time finally came around our whole team gathered in the library to set up. People began to arrive at the event at 3PM, with us set to begin at 3:30! Unfortunately, things backstage did not run completely smoothly, with a whole host of unanticipated technical issues cropping up — this ultimately meant that we were unable to stream the event live. However, the event was recorded and will be published very soon! Furthermore, we still had a live audience from whom we received a lot of positive feedback. Nathaneal Lessore at Orpington Library Literary Fest



On Wednesday 15th May, we went to Orpington Library for an author talk with Nathanael Lessore, whose book, "Steady for This", has been nominated for the Yoto Carnegie Shadowing Award for writing. This book is about a boy called Shaun who wants to be a rapper- MC Growls. He doesn't

have much money so he joins a live-stream performance with his friends during an MC Battle but is left humiliated after it goes viral for all the wrong reasons. Another book he has written is "King of Nothing", which is about a school bully called Anton who calls himself the King of Year 9. One day Anton gets in serious trouble but doesn't care, that is until his mum decides he needs to make some new friends and has signed him up to Happy Campers, a local activity group. After Matthew, the biggest loser in the school, saves his life, Anton figures maybe he is worth a shot.

Nathanael Lessore then went on to give us tips on how to write and what it's like to be an author. It was a lot more video games and Netflix than writing. Maybe I should be an author! Anyway, he told us about the structure he uses when writing his books. The three-act story structure is a popular writing technique used by lots of authors. It starts with the exposition (or the introduction as some people call it). He told us the best way to start the story is with action. Next is the inciting incident or the thing that sets the protagonist on their mission. In the case of Harry Potter, it would be when Hagrid tells him he is a wizard and has been accepted into Hogwarts. Then, it is the rising action, the main body of the story. There are usually three main points to the rising action. Next is the climax, which is the final showdown. Harry versus Voldemort! Finally is the denouement. This is when the plot is resolved and the characters are saying goodbye. Or, as Nathanael said, getting ready for a sequel! This would be when Harry is saying goodbye to Hagrid and says that he isn't really going home. He gave us examples of where this structure has been used in popular books.

He then went on to tell us that characters needed depth and that he liked to pretend to talk to his characters in order to gain a better understanding of what he wants them to be like - sort of like a job interview. He says to

ask your character questions: Who are your parents? Or what is your favourite hobby? Nathanael was signing books after the talk and although we didn't have time we had a really good time and were very glad we went.


