Message from the Head of School



It is certainly nice to write this newsletter on a day when the sun has been shining, the days seem to be getting that little bit longer and the first shoots of spring colour are popping up around the school site. We have started the term in the same vein as we finished the last, with lots of events and wider enrichment experiences which has already seen the largest ever

MusicFest with 32 sensational acts taking the stage with every year group represented, a group of intrepid explorers taking in the breathtakingly sights of Iceland as part of a Geography visit, our Year 8 & 9 mathematicians take part in the UKMT Maths Challenges and our Year 9 students taking part in a Careers Week.

I had the pleasure on Wednesday evening of judging the Year 9 First Give charity projects alongside Miss Krystal and Mr Turrell (Local Councillor). The event was a chance for students in each form group to creatively present, in front of an audience, their charity and talk about the social action activities they had completed in support of their chosen charity. From car washes to bakes sales, from book collections to raffles, the groups had certainly been creative in their social action choices. Wednesday was a culmination of all of the hard work and it was wonderful to see pupils from across Year 9 confidently presenting on the stage and answering questions from the panel about their work.

Well done to 9ELF and their tutors Mrs Foster and Mrs Redway-Handel whose chosen charity was ABC Books, an organisation who collect pre-owned books to build and develop libraries in the local area. The form group impressively collected in excess of 1500 books and were worthy recipients of the £1000 prize money which will be used by their chosen charity to further support their ongoing work.



We had double success in Sixth Form rugby last week with our Senior Girls team winning the Kent Rugby 7's tournament and our Boys First XV winning their semi-final in Torquay and making it through the final of the National Under 18 Bowl Final which will be held next week at Ealing Trailfinders Rugby Club. I could not be more proud of both teams and I know you will join me in saying a huge well done to our girls and wishing our boys good luck for next week's final.

Further to the enormous success of our inaugural Hayes School Question Time last May we were delighted to host students from across our Trust schools alongside 200 of our own students to participate in the audience of Hayes School's second 'Question Time' event on Thursday. This was an event run by our school's student media organisation, 'Hayes Communicates' and provided a unique opportunity for students to engage with key decision-makers in our community and pose questions to a panel of experts on matters of concern. I was privileged to be on stage with a panel of experts including members of parliament, local councillors, Bromley police, school and youth leaders.

This week we have launched our Year 9 Options process to students, parents and carers. There will be valuable opportunities in the coming weeks to talk to teachers and tutors in school and at Year 9 Parents' Evening. There is a range of online material including subject videos to support preparations and decision making, as well as a step by step guide on how the process works and I urge students and families to take advantage of this wealth of information prior to attending the parents evening.

Our upper school students are busy putting the finishing touches to their performances as they prepare to entertain us with two plays, Lord of the Flies and This Changes Everything. I look forward to seeing many of you at the performances on Thursday 20th and Friday 21st March.



Year 12 Fieldtrip to Hayes High Street








Year 10 Development Dynamics Student Work

Year 10s have recently been studying 'Development Dynamics'. Here is some brilliant work from Mr Brown's class, looking at population pyramids and approaches to development






Year 7 Coastal Work Student Work


Year 7s have been looking at coastal process.














Year 8


Year 8 are currently studying the Industrial Revolution and have been looking at the impact railways had on Britain.

Year 9 have been studying the causes of WW1 and some of the key events during WW1.


Here is an example from Lexi Mernaka of the Schlieffen plan and why it did not go as planned for the Germans.






Year 10 have started learning about Weimar and Nazi Germany and have been looking at the new government that was introduced after the Kaiser abdicated in 1918. They

Hayes Girls' Rugby 7s -Kent Champions!





On the 5th of February we took an afternoon flight to Munich and made our way to A&O Hostel München Hackerbrücke. We woke up in the morning for our buffet breakfast to get ready for a third Reich tour from Marienplatz with our tour lady! Of course, on our way there we had to fit all 17 of us into a small U-Bahn lift, which it is safe to say was quite a tight squeeze. Besides freezing from the crazily cold weather, we learned about the rise of Hitler, where he held his important meetings in Hofbräuhaus and had interesting 'swastikalike' mosaics on his office buildings, one being demolished and one a renowned music university building. This tour was greatly enlightening and very interesting to participate in, even with the cold! Following from this we made our way back to Marienplatz for a bit of

free time: buying souvenirs, eating 'Zimtschnecke' (cinnamon rolls), having a coffee and getting warm. We returned to Odeonsplatz from our tour to look at the stunning church, Theatinerkirche, which was gorgeous and extravagant both inside and outside. After being left in wonder at its beauty, we made our way to the Alte Pinakothek, after a debate on whether we'd rather see modern or old art, we landed on the older art. The museum was large and displayed traditional artworks in high ceiling rooms, even a Leonardo da Vinci painting. There was some very not visible lines in front of the

paintings that set off an alarm... which we most definitely did not set off... Once we had viewed some art and relaxed a bit, we made our way to an Italian restaurant, which was a much-needed energy boost. In addition to that, we played a group game of I-spy at the end of the meal, which is a standing tradition for our German trips which was and always is fun! To end the night with even more fun, we played mini golf, which was challenging but nevertheless enjoyable. With another night of sleep came another early start for us to make it in time for our tour at Dachau, a Nazi concentration camp. We were presented with the lovely Hans as our tour guide who delivered the tour with passion and a deep

understanding and knowledge of what he was speaking about. It was upsetting and devastating to see and hear about the camp's brutal past, but important in gaining our own understanding of events. After Dachau, we returned to central Munich to get lunch (a German döner for the cultural experience) and have an explore of gorgeous city. We reconvened at sunset, to get the best view of Munich, at the top of the 'Alte Peter' Church. After climbing for what seemed

like years we reached the top of the church, where the view was definitely worth the climb. As it became dusk, we descended back to ground level to get to our dinner at the iconic Hofbrauhaus. The atmosphere was so lively, and we all experienced authentic German cuisine, which some enjoyed more than others.... We ended the day with a trip to the cinema

to see Paddington 3 auf Deutsch, which we all really enjoyed! On our final day, we had our last

early start, heading off to the Allianz Arena, where we had a tour booked. We got to explore so much of the arena, even going into the changing rooms of the players and the press room. After a quick stop at the museum and gift shop, it was time to go, as we unfortunately had a flight to catch. After a long wait at passport control, where a lot of charades was played, we boarded our flight and made our way back to Hayes. Although we were all very tired and couldn't wait to sleep, we were all very sad about leaving Munich. It was such a fun and memorable trip. Thank you, Frau Castle and Frau Ridley, for everything!

Wednesday night, we rolled our cases out of Hackerbrücke station. Lampposts lit up the German street, illuminating the walk down to our hostel, where a tram or two would pass us. Conveniently, the hostel was only a short walking distance from two stations that would get us to the centre of Munich in no time. The town hall in Marienplatz, a large gothic revival building with its signature glockenspiel facing the heart of Munich, was the spot we were joined by a guide to receive a walking tour illustrating Munich's relevance in Nazi history. She spoke of Germany's previous monarchy and the Kaiser's love for the arts and showed us the places Hitler utilised during his time in power. After taking many



backstreets, passing beerhalls, the Residenz that housed Bavarian monarchs, we ended at Odeonplatz — a square between the former concert hall, the Odeon, and the golden path of bronze bricks.

We visited the Alte Pinakothek the next day, one of the oldest art galleries. It housed portraits and paintings dating between the fourteenth and eighteenth centuries. On the Friday, we travelled to Dachau. The tour guide and the site were able to convey its past suitably, most especially in a way that could reach a group who'd never seen a time where the abuse of power was so prominent and rid us of the disconnect that would be caused from simply reading an article far away in the warmth of a person's home.

Later that day, we climbed St Peter's tower which gave us the vast view of Munich's streets in its entirety. What felt like hours climbing those stairs were worth it as we received front row seats to the sun setting over Baroquestyle roofs. Dinner took place at the Hofbräuhaus, a three-floored grand beerhall which provided us a refreshing



traditional München meal, greatly eclipsing the McDonalds we had for lunch. Our last day, we arrived to a crisp blue sky over the Allianz Arena, where we received an indepth tour. The floors were still sort of sticky from the big game the night before but whatever enthusiasm those fans had was still left behind as we were taken into the conference rooms, the rented business rooms, changing rooms, and along the pitch to sit in the plush chairs, special for the team's coach and management. There was both a museum and a large shop we wandered around in for a while.

Overall, not one complaint was uttered the entire trip and on behalf of the Hayes Alevel German students and those that joined us from Langley Girls, thank you to Frau Castle, Frau Ridley and everyone else involved for organising this unforgettable trip.


