## Message from the Head of School



It is hard to believe how quickly our first term has passed as we head into the last week of term next week before the two week October break. There have been many highlights and much to celebrate in a packed six weeks so far as we embody our #wearehayes mantra.

Over the last few weeks we have welcomed students, parents and carers into school for our Year 11

Information Evening, Year 13 Parent Forum and tutor evenings in Year 7 and 12. It was especially pleasing to hear how well our new students have settled into the school and how successfully they have made the transition into secondary school and Hayes Sixth Form. The feedback we received from you on the school and the valuable information you shared as parents/carers will help us to work in partnership to best support your child this year.

Last week we launched the Bronze, Silver, and for the first time, the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award programmes to Years 9, 10 and 12 and we look forward to hearing about our young people's ideas for volunteering in the local community, as well as the skills and physical activity they plan to undertake as part of the Award.

Following the success of last year's relaunched of Academic Tutoring, last Friday, 1700 students came into school for 1:1 appointments with their tutor or a member of staff and we were able to give nearly 300 hours of time and individual attention to students. Across the school more than 6,000 targets were set, with students being supported to reflect on their achievements, their current position and areas of personal development. I know how valuable and rewarding staff found the opportunity to talk individually to students and how impressed they were with the thought, focus and commitment shown by them. It is our intention to share targets with parents and carers after the Half Term break so you too can encourage and nudge the journey towards their achievement.

Opening our doors to prospective students and parents last Saturday for our Annual Open Day event only served to remind me how fortunate I am to lead such a wonderful and committed staff and student body. The array of activities on offer, the confident and



thoughtful conversations from our guides and subject prefects, as well as demonstrations from our musicians and sports performers was inspiring. I know the Hayes community will have left a very positive impression on those who attended and we look forward to receiving applications from prospective Year 7's in the near future.

Our Year 7 concert this week provided us with a trip through the musical decades with each of our 10 music classes taking to the stage for their first time at Hayes to perform a class song they had learnt in their lessons. We were treated to a veritable music medley with hit songs from Musical Theatre as well as some 90's big hitters in the form of the Spice Girls and Oasis. I want to make a special mention of the 10 students who represented their class as the chosen soloist; their passion and confidence on stage was truly impressive.

A huge congratulations to Avangeline, Emily, Ellie, Sathvik, Henry, Albie, Peter and D-Mori the eight Hayes School recipients of the 2024 Jack Petchy Award who attended their prize giving event at the Churchill Theatre this week cheered on by Miss Owen and Mr Moore. The Jack Petchy award recognises young people for their hard work and efforts in a variety of fields and we could not be more proud of their achievements.

Next week the first of our in-person Parents Evenings takes place for our Year 11 cohort which provides a timely opportunity for teachers to share valuable information, advice and guidance ahead of the first round of Year 11 Mock Examinations in November. In speaking with Year 11's over the last few weeks I am buoyed by their sense of purpose and focus on making every minute count as they seek to build on their achievements from Year 10. It is never too early to have a revision plan and to get into good study habits!

Every October we celebrate Black History Month. This year's theme for Black History Month is "Reclaiming Narratives," and marks a significant shift towards recognising and correcting the narratives of Black history and culture. By emphasising "Reclaiming Narratives," we shine a brighter light on the stories, allegories, and history of black people across the globe.

One friend tried a hähnchen (chicken) and schnitzel burger, another picked up some local honey and a large pretzel, while the rest of us indulged in schnitzel with pommes (fries). The food was absolutely delicious.

That evening, we had dinner at the hostel and later went bowling, which was a blast. It was the perfect way to end the day, full of laughter and fun with everyone enjoying themselves.

#### Day 3

We started the day with breakfast as usual before boarding a train to the Allianz Arena. Unfortunately, it was pouring rain, and the cold was far more intense than we had expected. Despite the weather, we made it to the arena for a tour.

During the tour, we explored various sections of the stadium, including the different seating areas. We also visited the players' changing rooms, where we



had the chance to pose with the jerseys of FC Bayern Munich. We saw their gym, the area where people talk about the match and are asked questions by journalists, the field itself, and even the tunnel where the footballers walk out to play. Of course, we also stopped by the gift shop.

Just when we thought the tour was over, we were taken to the stadium's museum. It featured an impressive collection of memorabilia—jerseys from different eras, player histories, trophies, and even a fun area for kids to play football and draw. It was a really enjoyable experience, but eventually, we had to head back out into the pouring rain.

Our next stop was another trip to the farmers' market at Marienplatz.

My friends and I then went to the Haribo store and bought plenty of sweets—all at reasonable prices. We spent some more time shopping before heading back to the hostel to rest.

In the evening, we went to the cinema to watch Beetlejuice—in English, but with German

subtitles. Afterwards, we returned to the hostel and packed most of our things for the next day, when we would be heading home.

#### Day 4:

This was the day we were leaving, so after our usual morning routine, we had to pack all our belongings and strip the sheets and bedding

off our beds. However, leaving wasn't the only plan for the day. Before heading home, we decided to visit one more museum.



We took a tram to get there and passed a famous river called Einbach (Isar), where we stopped to pose for photos after our museum visit. The currents were incredibly strong! The museum itself was massive, with exhibits on space, planes, robotics, medicine, physics,

and much more - we didn't have time to see it all.

Afterwards, we headed to the Englischer Garten Süd, where we saw people surfing on the river's dangerous currents. Surprisingly, only one of them was wearing a helmet! We then walked to a bridge with a stunning view before exploring the park for a few minutes.

Afterwards, we headed back to the hostel, but not before grabbing a bite to eat—my friends and I stopped at a chip shop.

Finally, it was time to leave. We collected our bags and boarded the coach that would take us to the airport. After checking our bags and passing through security, we had some time to relax. However, when we reached our gate, we found out the flight was overbooked, and they were asking for volunteers to take a later flight. This delayed us by about 45 minutes, but eventually, we boarded and said our

goodbyes to Munich. An hour and 15 minutes later, we landed back in England.

This trip was truly amazing and will definitely be a memorable experience, but it's always nice to come home.
