Message from the Head of School



As we settle into a new school year and I formally begin my new role as Head of School, I can't help but reflect on one of the events that became somewhat of a backdrop to the Summer of 2024. A summer where several cities in the UK, witnessed a series of riots that raised significant concerns about the harmful effects of misinformation and particularly that which is present in our on-line and social media world. As digital natives, our young people have grown up under the ubiquitous influence of the internet and other

modern information technologies and today more than ever are bombarded with a constant stream of influence and information that can be difficult to navigate; and as we saw, led to people as young as 11 being arrested and charged with offences linked to these riots.

In our whole school assembly this week Mrs Arney has sought to dispel some of the myths surrounding the riots and impress upon all students the need for open dialogue and the reporting of concerns, particularly in terms of safeguarding. We have additionally been speaking at Trust level about wider complexities surrounding the riots that affect young people, and will continue to address the issues raised through this lens in our personal development curriculum and in our daily conversations with students.

In my start of term assemblies, I have had the pleasure of sharing my passion for sport and have used example from both the Olympic and Paralympic Games as a means to amplify the importance of pride and belonging, to ensure we work with determination and resilience and to never underestimate the power of kindness and support for others in reaching our goals.

The games also provided a catalyst to get students to think about setting their own bar high as they establish new goals and aspirations both inside



of and outside the classroom for the year ahead. I also spoke about the Olympic values of Excellence, Respect and Friendship and how these values are echoed in that of our Hayes Learner. At the heart of our Hayes Learner are the attributes of Kindness,



Empathy, Acceptance, Respect, Responsibility and Pride, and I remind students and members of our school community the importance of embodying these values every day in every lesson. #WeAreHayes

In these first few weeks of term we have and will be asking students to look back at last year and to consider the year ahead. This is an opportunity for them to reflect on what they were most proud of last year, to write their story for the year ahead and make their own commitments (or resolutions). Further to the success of our Academic Tutoring programme last year we are planning to follow a similar format, and on Friday 4th October will follow up on these reflections and hold 1:1 conversations with all students during the day. More details of this will be sent in the coming weeks.

We continue to explore the responses to out student survey conducted in the Summer Term and will in the next few weeks be working with our Student Leadership groups, Year Council and Student Council to consider how we continue to connect with our students so their experiences are such that every student feels a sense of belonging and pride in our school.

It has been a real highlight for me over the last two weeks to meet and speak with new Year 7 and 12 students who have recently joined the school. I have also enjoyed catching up with current students as they have shared exciting stories of their summer exploits; I have to admit to also quietly smiling to myself as they have expressed how glad they are to be back at school and into a routine.

I look forward to meeting you at a number of the events taking place this term and thank you for the continued support you provide to the school and my colleagues. I wanted to particularly highlight an event new to our school calendar in December which will see an additional school show 'Matilda' take the stage with a lower school cast from Years 7-9.

I sincerely hope that this year is successful and enjoyable for your child and know that by working together we can support them to be 'the best version of themselves' in all that they do.

The accomplishments of our students are truly commendable and reflect the dedication and hard work of both staff and students, as well as the invaluable support from parents and carers. Thanks to these combined efforts, our students are once again celebrating an impressive set of exam results.

We are incredibly proud to share that over 81% of our Year 11


A huge congratulations to all our students who took Level 1, Level 2,

We are incredibly proud to share that over 81% of our Year 11 students achieved a grade 4 or higher in English and Maths, with more than 60% earning a grade 5 or above in these subjects. Fantastic performances were seen at the top end, with approximately one in four Year 11 students achieving grades 7-9. Nearly two-thirds of our students earned grades 5-9 across all their subjects, enabling them to successfully secure entry into Level 3 courses, apprenticeships, and their chosen further education pathways.



The A-Level and Level 3 results were equally impressive, with nearly 60% of grades awarded at A*-B, surpassing the national average, and over 80% at A*-C. At the highest level of achievement, almost a quarter of the grades were A* or A. Vocational courses also saw strong outcomes, with one in three grades being a Distinction or Distinction*. The diverse range of courses offered at Hayes Sixth Form, combined with the outstanding resources available, continues to provide students with qualifications that align with their individual strengths and future ambitions.

It is no surprise that, following these Year 13 successes, nearly 90% of university applicants secured a spot at their top-choice institutions. Many students pursued popular courses such as Mathematics and Science (including Medicine), Accounting, Business, Economics, and Finance, along with Psychology and Social Sciences. These achievements have also paved the way for an increasing number of students to secure competitive apprenticeships with well-known companies, while others have transitioned directly into full-time employment.

KS3 Graduation








On the day, there were displays throughout the school, including posters designed by students and a world map that pin-pointed all the different cultures and nationalities represented at Hayes School, which is far more diverse than you may have realised. Responses to the student survey showed that the Hayes community represents:

- 37 different countries of birth
- 75 different languages
- 16 different religions
- 88 different nationalities

Across the curriculum, teachers planned and delivered lessons with a cultural focus.

Hayes PE department had the pleasure of taking 42 students from Year 11-Year 13 to South Africa on a rugby and Netball tour. Students were exposed to a vast range of sporting and cultural opportunities on the 10 day tour.

We arrived in a wet Cape Town, the city experiencing some of the most unsettled weather conditions they have had in years. This unfortunately put pay to our Table Mountain visit but didn't stop the students immediately immersing themselves in South African culture.





Fortunately for us the u20 rugby world cup was being hosted in Cape Town and we were able to witness England win both their semi-final and then their final during our stay which I know was real highlight for many of the group.

Rugby and Netball training sessions allowed the students to acclimatise and both Rugby and Netball teams played some incredible matches while on tour. The Rugby team had the chance to play the top rugby school in the South Africa in Paul Roos - for context their 1st xv usually play in front of 10,000 students and their games are streamed live on

National TV. Fortunately for us we played a 3rd xv and it was a extremely competitive game with the boys just ending up on the wrong side of the scoreline. The netball team got the chance to compete against one of the top netball schools in the country in Bloemhof and while the girls didn't come out on top it was a great experience for the girls. Both teams



played two other fixtures with the boys winning 1 and losing 1 with Ashton Singh scoring a try for the ages. The girls were more successful winning their other two fixtures, with Holly Lewis leading from the back with outstanding defence and sharp shooter Alice Suggett showing some fantastic shooting skills. The opportunity to socialise with the opposition and be hosted by all the teams was a great experience and showed why touring is so valuable both on and off the pitch.


The visit to Robben Island was one no one will ever forget and to be shown around by an ex prisoner was a truly humbling experience. Students also had the chance to visit a township on the


BORNEO EXPEDITION

Sixteen Hayes students from Year 11-13 had a fantastic time on the Borneo expedition over the summer. Some sections of the expedition were challenging, some relaxing, all of them fascinating and rewarding.

Some of the highlights for students which you can see in the photos and reports below were: Snorkelling in tropical seas seeing fish including sharks and sea turtles, helping clear beaches of the enormous amount of plastic waste that drifts from the Pacific Garbage Patch, visiting night markets and trying out local food, seeing Orangutans and Sun Bears in the jungle reserves; staying overnight in jungle lodges; trekking in the foothills of Mount Kinabalu and staying in a local village; white water rafting and a final blow out meal in Kota Kinabalu with mocktails watching the sunset go down over the bay and the TAR islands.



We pride ourselves on being able to offer such a broad range of extra curricular sporting clubs at Hayes and we want students of all levels of experience and ability to give the clubs and activities a go. You will find the autumn timetable attached and we would love to see as many students at these clubs as possible. We have seen that in the last two years we have run a/b/c team fixtures in a variety of sports meaning that many more students have the opportunity to represent the school in fixtures if they desire. Equally we have a number of students who just wish to come for enjoyment and we cater for this equally.

To allow students to experience as wide a range of sports as possible we try to focus our attention on a different "Games" sport each term. So if you do not see a sport you have played before on the timetable it may be because we run it at a different time of year.

In the autumn term for the boys we focus on rugby, although there are some county cup football fixtures that happen. In the spring term we focus on football and the summer term we focus on cricket. Basketball is played throughout both autumn and spring terms. The girls set up is slightly different with netball and football being played in both autumn and spring terms and rounders and cricket being played in the summer. This is due to how fixtures are arranged slightly differently. All of these sports are supplemented by many other sports and activities which we play competitive fixtures in for example tennis, athletics and volleyball.



Parent Forum with Paul Cabb, ASD advisor Wednesday 25th September 5-6.30pm

We are joined each term by Paul Cabb and ASD advisor who has worked with Hayes, and many local schools, for many years. Each session will feature a presentation focused on a specific topic, followed by the chance to ask queries and to meet and chat to other parents of neurodiverse children.



In this session, based on parent feedback, Paul will be sharing advice around supporting students in managing and understanding social interactions. Navigating relationships with both peers and adults can become increasingly challenging for autistic children and young people as they progress through secondary school.

The focus of this term's parent forum is:

'Managing interactions and supporting perspectives'


